Aim of the Seminar

Following the setting up of the new Health and Safety Executive Board in 2008, one of its first undertakings was to reset and reaffirm the direction of health and safety in its Strategy document, published last year. This document recognises and addresses the many stakeholders who have a role to play in maintaining or improving health and safety standards. This Seminar aims to show how the Strategy can be applied in a simple and practical way in the workplace, by using case studies that have particular relevance in smaller organisations.

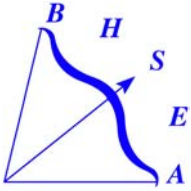
Seminar Content

In the opening presentation, Rosi Edwards, Regional Director, HSE Midlands Division, will explain where we are now in terms of general health and safety standards. This will be reinforced by a case study of a typical small undertaking and delegate syndicates will be asked to make their own assessment of what needs to be done to improve standards. They will be given guidance on how to focus on key points for the feedback sessions to their "Managing Director".

This initial appraisal will be followed by a further input from Rosi Edwards on how the HSE Strategy aims to encourage all stakeholders to move forward in a co-ordinated fashion. This will be expanded by presentations from the BHSEA Facilitators on practical workplace measures that will give improvements in key areas identified in the HSE Strategy. The learning points from these presentations will be reinforced by a second case study, followed by a feedback session, with input from delegates, HSE and BHSEA Facilitators.

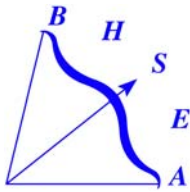

David Hughes MCMi MCIPD MIIRSM, Hughes Business Services

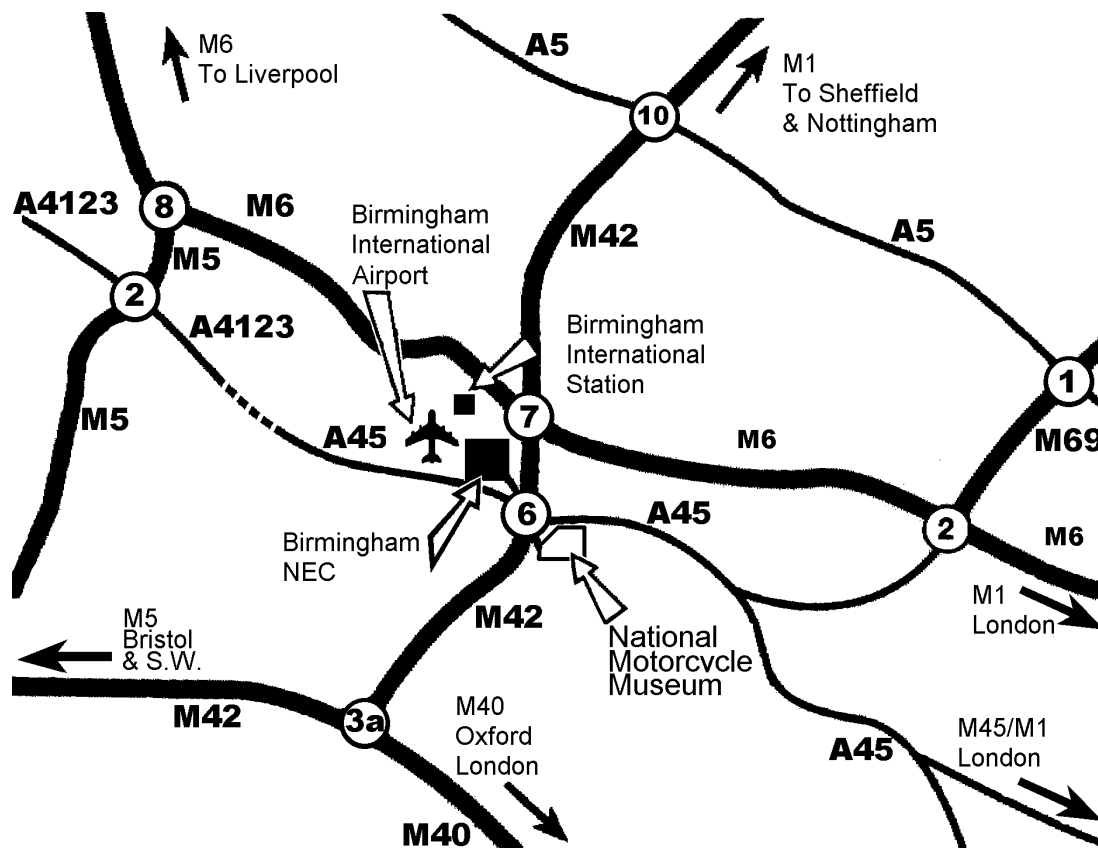

The National Motorcycle Museum is located at the heart of the UK Motorway Network, on Junction 6 of the M42 at its intersection with the A45. The major access routes are as follows: -

From the north

M1 Southbound, Exit J23a, then A42 and M42 Southbound OR
M6 Southbound – Exit J4a, then M42 Southbound, OR
M6 Southbound – Exit J8, then M5 Southbound, Exit J4a, then
M42 Northbound, OR
M42 Southbound, Exit J6.

From the South

M1 Northbound, Exit J17, then M45 and A45 Westbound, OR
M1 Northbound, Exit J19, then M6 Northbound, Exit J4, then
M42 Southbound, Exit J6, OR
M5 Northbound, Exit J4a, then M42, Exit J6
