





## The Health & Safety Executive or HSE enforce health and safety laws applying to business.

#### Their powers include:

- Entering your premises and inspecting the workplace;
- Stopping work if it is unsafe;
- Take samples, measurements, and photographs;
- Dismantle and remove articles or substances;
- Take possession of articles and substances;
- Question people in relation to the workplace;
- Review documents and take copies;
- Issue enforcement notices (formal letter, Improvement notice, prohibition notice);
- Caution you and initiate prosecutions.

The HSE also provide advice and guidance to help you comply with the law.

#### HEALTH AND SAFETY AT WORK ETC ACT 1974

refer to my inspection of your construction works at on Monday 1<sup>st</sup> July 2013 where I understand from Mr. that are acting as Principal Contractor for the new build homes on behalf of Group Limited.

#### Action Required

During my visit, I identified the contraventions of health and safety law listed in Appendix 1 of this letter. You must take action on these matters to comply with the law and Appendix 1 discusses the steps you should take.

Whilst I looked at some of your activities to assess how you were complying with your legal responsibilities, I did not examine the whole of your business. There may be additional areas to those I identified which also require your attention; it is your responsibility to ensure the health and safety of people who may be affected by the way you run your business.

#### HEALTH AND SAFETY (FEES) REGULATIONS 2012 ('THE FEES REGULATIONS 2012') -FEE FOR INTERVENTION

I am notifying you that the contraventions in Appendix 1 are, in my opinion, material breaches for which a fee is payable by you to HSE under Fee for Intervention. My reasons for this are also given in Appendix 1.


### Fee for Intervention (FFI)


- The HSE also operates a Fee for Intervention (FFI) cost recovery scheme.
- If you are breaking health and safety laws, the HSE may recover its costs from you by charging a fee for the time and effort it spends on helping you to put the matter right, such as investigating and taking enforcement action.
- The current cost is £163 an hour.



# Being prepared for an HSE workplace inspection

- The best way to be prepared for a HSE inspection is to be continuously monitoring your own workplace for a safe working environment and statutory compliance.
- Maintain auditable records and certification which demonstrate statutory compliance.
- Check for HSE initiatives and campaigns so that you can focus in these specific areas. Information can be gained from sources such as BHSEA and the HSE website.
- Hold a debrief following an HSE visit.
